## **Executive summary**

**Personnel:** Performance reviews were completed for all the coordinators.

**Assessment:** The Task Force on the Future of Print Collection Retention and Access completed its charge and submitted its final report and recommendations for future exploration of print retention in the SE/A. The report will be shared with the Oversight Regional Advisory Committee and staff discussion will be held on ways to implement the recommendations. A fall deadline is expected before next steps are taken.

**Contract:** SE/A staff assisted the University of Maryland Health Sciences and Human Services staff with the completion of a proposal to be the regional medical library for the National Network of Libraries of Medicine Southeastern/Atlantic Region. The proposal was submitted to NLM on June 3. A second proposal was also prepared to be the National Online Training Center. Due to an error in the statement of work, a revised proposal was prepared and will be submitted to NLM by the August 9 deadline. The HS/HSL and SE/A appreciate the assistance of SE/A members that participated in the mid-contract feedback questionnaire, strategic planning meeting, outreach activities, advisory committees, or private consultation for their ideas and creativity in developing these proposals.

**Network Activities:** SE/A staff attended the annual RML directors meeting in Washington DC on May 21. Janice provided a brief overview and handout on the recommendations of the Task Force on the Future of Print Collection Retention and Access. Staff also attended the annual meeting of the Medical Library Association meeting in Washington, DC. Janice served as co-chair of the Local Assistance Committee and completed her term on the Leiter Lecture Committee.

**E-patient symposium:** Terri spearheaded a committee that planned and executed a successful symposium focusing on the interaction between technology, culture, and politics as they relate to e-health. The ethical, social, and privacy issues concerning new technologies were discussed during lunch roundtables using case scenarios. The symposium featured speakers and panel discussion of experts, consumer and librarians demonstrating new and upcoming technologies such as personal health records and e-health tools.

**Outreach Funding:** We completed most of the funding for year 05 projects by early June. We funded six outreach projects, two Welcome Awards, four Express Planning and Assessment Awards, one Community Day Award, three Express Mobile Technology Pilot Project Awards, seven Express Outreach Awards, one Express Disaster Recovery Award, six Express Technology Improvement Awards, two Express Hospital Library Promotion Awards, two Express Digitization Awards, two Express Follow-up Awards, three Express Technology Awareness Awards, and one enhancement award for an e-science symposium. In addition we funded 12 exhibit awards and four training awards. The exhibit, training and disaster recovery awards will remain open until all funds are expended.

The University of Maryland Baltimore's Office of Research and Development had several retirements and reassignments. Therefore subcontracts and memorandum of understandings have been slow in reaching awardees. We hope to have all them signed and delivered by the end of August.

**Advocacy:** Janice completed site visits to two resource libraries. She visited with new directors and staff at the Tompkins McCaw Library at the Virginia Commonwealth University and the Robert C. Bryd Health Sciences Center library at West Virginia University. Janice and Terri also visited with the staff of the Mountain AHEC in Asheville, NC, in support of their outreach projects. Janice met with Wendy Hellwig, a library intern at Hopkins Bayview Medical Center. They discussed the structure and function of the NN/LM and regional programs in specific.

**Beyond the SEA programming:** In July we held the first of our e-Science regional programming. Michelle Tennet and Cecilia Botera provided an excellent hour long overview of e-science and the librarian role. This programming will be followed by a symposium at the Mid-Atlantic Chapter of MLA meeting in Chapel Hill on October 15 where Neil Rambo will present on the role of librarians followed by a panel discussion.

### **Regional Advisory Committee (RAC) activities**

The SE/A Task Force on the Future of Print Collection Retention and Access completed its charge to identify the changes, issues, and problems affecting the collection and retention of print resources (journals and monographs) in SE/A libraries; recommend studies, such as collection comparison, or methods to employ to ensure that access to information resources is available when needed; and recommend strategic directions the SE/A and network libraries can take to build new collaborations, use new technologies or encourage future dialogue and attentiveness to ensure access to print and electronic materials in the region.

Recommendations of the task force included:

- An analysis of the NLM produced lists to determine if there are unique titles that require retention.
- Formal arrangements should be negotiated with resource libraries to identify titles they will retain, to include institutional level commitments that are endorsed by administration and re-visited at each contract renewal.
- A few academic libraries with storage space could serve as regional print repositories; funding sources to move endangered titles to those locations.
- If the non-NLM held titles that merit retention or a local digitization project; more funding for digitization projects.
- Programming at chapter and state association meetings.
- Education/dialogue about print retention issues.
- Identification of titles that can be safely de-accessioned and document discard options.
- Sharing language to keep e-resource licenses open for resource sharing.
- Promotion of the NLM Journal Donation Program.
- Encouraging member libraries to maintain accurate SERHOLD records.
- The National Library of Medicine lead print retention/preservation/repository pilot projects across regions, and regions collectively create national guidelines; identify titles that should be retained by one or two institutions in each region and available for disasters; involve the History of Medicine community in discussions; provide additional funding to RMLs for related initiatives.
- The Task Force becomes an SE/A Committee to devote attention to the points above.
- This Task Force will prepare an article for SE/A Currents that highlights some of the discoveries and recommendations in this report, and share the NLM lists prepared for Region 2 via the website donated by East Tennessee State University.

**Update of ongoing major projects (funded at ≥ \$15,000)**

**East Tennessee State University - *Appalachian Underserved Healthcare Providers Evidence-based Information Training and Delivery Project***

Summary of activity: Project participants attended Epocrates software training for the PDA devices they will be distributing to rural hospitals, contacted partners at the Tennessee Hospital Association, created a list of the first hospitals that will receive PDAs, and loaded the Epocrates software onto the PDAs.

**University of Virginia – *NN/LM National Emergency Preparedness Plan Coordination***

Summary of activity: Dan reported on the national project at the RML directors meeting in May in Washington DC. In June Dan presented Step 1 of the 10-Steps to Service Continuity Planning to the NN/LM Mid-Continental Region. In July Dan reviewed the final report of the toolkit usability study and began planning changes in the structure and design. He also participated in the OERC call with the associate directors and NNO about a follow-up study.

**University of Miami – *Librarians and DOCS***

Summary of activity: The library staff participated in two nurses well health fairs – one at the Jackson Memorial Hospital and the other at the University of Miami Hospital. They spoke to 400 people and distributed 600 pamphlets in English, Spanish and Creole on MedlinePlus and NIHSeniorhealth.gov, hand sanitizers and pens. Participation was well received.

**University of South Carolina – *Linking South Carolina Free Clinics to Quality Health information***

Summary of activity: Project staff visited the three clinics with whom they will be working to discuss training and equipment needs and placement. They hope to have the equipment in place by September.

**Eastern Shore AHEC – *Teen Health Initiative, Phase 2***

Summary of activity: Staff completed the planning for the school year beginning in September. Project staff made contact with five principals to facilitate meetings with health instructors and three library system that are partners on the project. Each library will supply one staff to discuss in the classroom the resources and databases available to students. Caroline County Public Library will be the first to receive the library display.

**Delta State University – *Clarksdale Diabetes & Metabolism Center***

Summary of activity: The following interventions were made from May 1 thru July 31, 2010:

- Congestive Heart Failure- 42
- COPD- 8
- Diabetes- 30
- Sickle Cell- 0

There were no meetings or other activities reported during this time period.

### **Rural Medical Services – Popular Theater: Educating farm workers through entertainment**

Summary of activity: During this quarter, RMS continued to orient and train the theater group. There have been two performances that include new scripts:

- Drugs, Alcohol and HIV/AIDS
- Mental Health

A contract extension was approved for this project through October 2010. Plans are being made for the visit and training of the communications expert, Ismael Bevilacqua that will take place in September.

### **Mountain AHEC - Healthy Kids in Western North Carolina**

Final report: The main focus of this project was to create one place (an online spreadsheet) where public health and related personnel in Western North Carolina can discover and share information about regional programs and activities aimed at reducing and preventing childhood obesity. Thanks to the diligence and hard work of Jennifer Stuart, the librarian on this project, each of the sixteen counties in WNC and the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians has at least one of their programs or activities recorded in the online spreadsheet and most counties have multiple programs and activities listed. Entries are from Health Departments, Healthy Carolinians, NC Cooperative Extension agents (family, nutrition, 4H or youth), School Nutritionists, School Nurses and other related personnel. In support of continuation of this project, Jennifer offered training in how to add to and update information in the spreadsheet, and created an online survey that populates data in the spreadsheet. However, few people actually entered data themselves, but instead gave it to Jennifer to add to the spreadsheet. The large, regional initiative that this project supported “WNC Healthy Kids,” has secured funding to continue Jennifer’s position and her work on this important project.

### **University of Maryland – College of Information Studies – Collaborative Computer Training to Improve Older Adult’s e-health literacy: a pilot study**

Summary of activity: During the fourth quarter, teaching was completed at the Hyattsville and New Carrollton branch libraries with a total of 34 older adults participating. Classes were offered at the Britt Senior Activity Center in North Brentwood, MD with a total of 33 older adults participating.

Final Report: This project built on and expanded a 2007-2009 project funded by a previous NN/LM outreach award. The previous project focused on developing and providing computer classes to train older adult patrons of public libraries to use computers and the Internet to access and use reliable health information. The current project added the collaborative learning component to computer classes. Findings of the current project can advance our knowledge about optimal computer training strategies for older adults particularly in the health literacy area. This project demonstrates the continued interest and ability of a Library and Information Science (LIS) school of the University to collaborate with community partners to improve older adults’ access to and use of health information, which addresses the call of the National Network of Libraries of Medicine (NN/LM) for building strong partnerships between public libraries, communities and local organizations to work together to provide health information.

### **University of South Alabama- Empowering Health Ministry Leaders**

Summary of activity: Computer training sessions continued, covering Open Office tools, including the spreadsheet. Regular training classes are no longer being held but assistance is given as needed. Led by one of the project collaborators, an additional training session was held on the health check tools.

Three health fair planning meetings were held, one each month. Documents on planning and holding a health fair were identified and shared with the health ministry leaders. Those who had previously held a health fair in their church shared documents such as a vendor list and screening data form. A draft plan including a time-line was developed and used as a point of discussion at the meetings. A list of University of South Alabama departments that would be willing to participate was developed and shared with the group. Possible publicity activities were discussed. Dates have been set and locations have been secured. Efforts are being made to involve other churches in the community/zip code in the planning process for the individual health fairs.

The Health Ministry Leaders continued to meet with the Center for Health Communities Community Health Advocates. This will be an avenue for continuation of this network of health ministry leaders.

A no-cost extension was requested and approved. The timeline has been adjusted and is attached. A budget revision was submitted.

### **Western Maryland AHEC - Western Maryland/West Virginia Outreach**

Summary of activity: This quarter was devoted to planning activities, with the project coordinator meeting with the health professions caucuses to determine training needs and schedule trainings to begin in September. The proposal to present at the West Virginia Library Association (WVLA) meeting in October was approved. Sadly, the originally designated project coordinator, D. Michele Beaulieu, lost her battle with ovarian cancer during this reporting period. The project librarian has assumed the coordinator position and plans to incorporate ovarian cancer resources into her trainings, when appropriate, in an act of remembrance and to alert women to the subtle early warning signs of this deadly cancer.

**James Madison University – Using Informatics to Bridge the Gap in Health Literacy**

Summary of activity: The co-principal investigator left James Madison University. Jennifer McCabe, the nursing librarian, will continue as the sole principal investigator. JMU did not receive the fully executed agreement from the University of Maryland so the project start was delayed. No report is enclosed

**Rural Medical Services Inc. – ACCESS - Acceso a Servicios de Salud**

Summary of activity: RMS is excited to be starting the next phase of their project – a natural progression from their Popular Theatre Project. Producing videos is a new venture and they are eager to learn from the process and optimistic that useful products will be created. They have contracted a talented Video Director and assistant, oriented the team, conducted two productive community assessments and started to write the scripts. They are working on getting the computer updated and buying the software. General filming has begun.

Major purchases and progress have been delayed while RMS awaits their contract which has been delayed at UMB. They are still waiting for the Purchase Order number to start reimbursements for this project. They are unable to make major purchases, like the video editing software, until the contract and P.O. information comes through.

**University of the Virgin Islands – Empowering Paradise**

Summary of activity: Due to UMB’s delayed processing of the award contract, the project is late getting started. The most significant accomplishment for the quarter is in fact the successful completion of the contract document. Signatures required at the University of the Virgin Islands could not be obtained without review by the Institution’s legal counsel. Once the preliminary matters were addressed the next step was to have fund numbers established for appropriate recording and oversight of funds and expenditures.

When the accounting procedures have been completed, an appointment for the project coordinator will be prepared with a start date of August 23, 2010. This will allow considerable momentum in addressing the activities planned for the project to move forward.

**University of Maryland Eastern Shore- Closing the Gap on Diabetes Health Professional Education Project**

Paperwork with the University of Maryland was not received during the quarter so no activities were completed. No report is enclosed.

**P.I. Advocates, Inc - Health Information Computer Access Training**

Summary of activity: Although PIA got a late start due to the long delay in receiving their contract from UMB and the special nature of their project— “Health Information Computer Access Training”, they still managed to exceed their average monthly goal of training 10 people. They trained women and men from the general public/library/community and from local substance abuse programs. Training workshops were conducted at three partnering libraries in the District of Columbia; **(1)** Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Library, **(2)** Anacostia Neighborhood Library, and **(3)** Northwest One Neighborhood Library.

Outreach data:

All workshops had on average **98% minority residents** of the District and surrounding area.

Total # of training workshops = 7

Total # of health information sessions = 4

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Total # of people trained = 131

Total # of people PIA provided PowerPoint health information sessions to: 79

**Inova Fairfax Hospital – Northern Virginia Health Literacy Initiative**

Summary of activity: Activities focused on administrative and planning activities. Partners have been identified and foundational work initiated in marketing, evaluation, and product development.

**Congregations for Public Health – *Healthy Spirit 2010***

Paperwork with the University of Maryland was not received during the quarter so no activities were completed. No report is enclosed.

**East Tennessee State University - *MedlinePlus: Orientation and Instruction***
